

DAY 1 ORIGINAL GOODNESS Wednesday 26 February

God coming into the world in human form was an affirmation that creation – physical, tangible, messy creation – is good. Very good. And that includes you.



DAY 3 THE KINGDOM IS YOU Friday 28 February

How does God's rule come about on Earth? The Pharisees of Jesus' day would have insisted this was a matter for God to determine. Our place was to wait passively for it to happen. The best we could do was to look out for signs of its arrival.

Jesus presented things differently. He brought God's presence, power and authority into human affairs in a dynamic way, so all that is hostile to the thriving of creation is ultimately overcome.

However, by describing the kingdom as 'in your midst', Jesus suggests we have a part to play. The phrase he uses might be better translated 'within your grasp'.

As we accept God's invitation to be his hands and feet, we help to bring about the healing of his creation, and his rule is made manifest.

Lord Jesus Christ,

In your coming to Earth you made known to us the reality of God's kingdom. Give us courage to lay hold of the power and authority you have entrusted to us, and to partner with you in revealing your rule on Earth as in heaven. Amen.

ADOPTED INTO THE LINEAGESunday 1 March

'Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God.'
(John 1:12)

In Jewish culture, as well as others, a person's societal status was (and is) directly related to their lineage. It determines where they live, the occupation they pursue, and the opportunities available to them.

As God's chosen people, the Israelites thought they had exclusive access to God. His promises and blessings were because of their lineage as descendants of Abraham. Anyone else was seen as a gentile or – as one without the promise.

They observed many customs which distinguished them from surrounding nations as God's chosen people. The act of observing those customs was not what made them God's people. Instead, it was the outward reflection of that God had chosen them.

Amazingly, God has done the same for us through His own will and sacrifice of Jesus Christ. This new covenant is not only with the descendants of one man – but to the whole world! The only criteria for this covenant is to receive Jesus as the Messiah, and believe in his name (as the Son of God). Anyone who receives and believes in Jesus is given the right to become a child of God.

What an incredible thought! That we can be children of God and have access to all His protection, provision, and inheritance. Let us never forget the great hope we have in Him.

DAY 6 SLOW DOWN Monday 2 March

My family were immediately sceptical when I encountered God and began going to church.



DAY 21 EMBRACE VULNERABILITY Tuesday 17 March

But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' (2 Corinthians 12:9)

Paul, an apostle of Jesus, is important in the eyes of the people of the church in Corinth. He is their pastor, teacher and famous all over the region. In the Roman Empire, it would have been unusual to be willing to express weakness. Many people today struggle to show any kind of vulnerability. You rise to the top by being strong. But the way of the kingdom is different.

If you or I were faced with difficulty or hardship, our instinct, like Paul's, might be to pray for them to be removed (2 Corinthians 12:8). Paul's prayer was answered, but not in the way he was expecting: 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.'

This answered prayer meant that Paul could be honest about his weaknesses, because he was following the way of the cross – even though it looked like foolishness to the world (1 Corinthians 1:18).

Dear God,

Help me to trust you even in weakness. Help me to boast not in my own strength, but only in the cross where defeat is turned to victory and death is turned to life. Amen.

DAY 22 COMMUNITY Wednesday 18 March

'Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfil the law of Christ.' (Galatians 6:2)

When I was going through the most difficult periods of my life, there's no way I could have done it without the support of friends, family and church. If we truly want to care for ourselves, then the first thing we must do is reach out to others.

Thank you for the gift of relationship and community. For those of us who are lonely, bring the comfort of closeness into our lives. For those of us who are not lonely, help us to see those who are, and help us to reach out to them. Amen.

DAY 23

THE INJUSTICE OF EXCLUSION

Thursday 19 March

'Cursed is anyone who withholds justice from the foreigner, the fatherless or the widow.' (Deuteronomy 27:19)

We live in a world where the vulnerable, dispossessed and disadvantaged are more likely to experience injustice than their prosperous, privileged counterparts. Any society that fails to uphold fair treatment for all falls short of God's expectations.

Who is the foreigner, fatherless or widow from whom justice is withheld in our modern world? They are the economic migrant, the asylum seeker, the victim of sex trafficking, the orphan, the lone parent, the unemployed, the victim of war. I could go on.

What they all have in common, however, is that God knows who they are. He understands their suffering and calls on us, his followers, to stand with them, and to work with them to ensure they get the justice that is rightfully theirs.

Lord,

You are a just God. You love everyone equally and want everyone to be treated fairly. Let me be an instrument of justice, and not be fearful of calling out injustice when I see it. Amen.

Familiarity can lead to unfamiliarity. I wonder if we've become so familiar with the parable of the Good Samaritan that we've forgotten how shocking it is.



Give us the strength to deal with brokenness in a healthy way; give us the patience to hold fast while we wait for resurrection. Help us to not return the pain that we are dealt, but transform us into instruments of greater love. Amen.

DAY 37 PEACE Thursday 2 April

Peace of God surpasses comprehension: 'peace is better than all understanding.'


Peace of God shields heart and mind: 'the peace of God... will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.'

DAY 41 KNOW WHO TO RUN TO Monday 6 April

'But those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.' (Isaiah 40:31)

I love this verse. It has been such an encouragement to me in challenging seasons of life. I love its imagery and the invitation to set our gaze back on God.

As we look around at our world right now, there is so much that can cause our hearts to be overwhelmed with sorrow. The word 'hope' in this verse is 'qavah' in Hebrew. It means to expect and to eagerly long for. This waiting on the Lord isn't a passive waiting, it's active and full of faith that God can move.

There is a brilliant African proverb that says, 'It is not wise to accept the offer of a shirt from a naked man'. In other words, if something is so good, the person offering it to you should be using it too.

If one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead.' (James 2:16-17)

For many years, the tech giant Google had the phrase 'Don't be evil' as their corporate motto. At first, this seems an honourable enough aim. However, it doesn't stand up to any greater scrutiny.

It isn't enough to not be evil. It isn't enough to not do any harm. We must actively, purposefully, deliberately seek to do good.

There is a Jewish concept – *tikkun olam* – that means literally 'the repair of the world'. It has come to embody a life that is lived in pursuit of justice and compassion; one that is defined by acts of kindness, great and small.

A faith that ignores the current needs of the world is meaningless. If the church does not take deliberate action for the healing of the world, it is nothing but a clanging symbol – just noise. We all need to live with *tikkun olam* in our hearts.

God of repair,

Fill us with love – the love that leads to compassion. Fill us with faith – the faith that leads to action. And fill us with hope – the hope that leads to a better world for all. Amen.

DAY 43 IN THE DARKNESS Wednesday 8 April

'Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.' (Lamentations 3:22-23)

I often get asked how I keep doing what I'm doing in the face of the stories I hear of women being abused by their husbands and partners. What I hear is horrific, sometimes barbaric, always diminishing the survivors of abuse.

With each story of abuse, however, there is a counter-story of hope and love. This comes in the form of Christians reaching out to provide unconditional support, to walk alongside the survivor to bring healing, justice and hope for the future.

Personally, this is about discipleship and obedience to God's calling. When I co-founded Restored in 2010, I had lamented to God about the situation, and I heard God challenge me to step up and out of my comfort zone to do something.

When the darkness closes in, may I see your light of love shining through and showing the way forward. Grant me the courage to bring your light and love to those in need. Amen.

Thus, we should never give up, even when we are the only ones in our neighbourhood taking initiatives to replant trees, recycle and live sustainably.

We pray that you will give us supernatural strength to continue to do good and care for your creation and one another. We also thank you for the harvest that will come from this work... in our time and in that of the generations to come. Amen.
